CALL FOR PAPERS

The papers we like to invite for this workshop can have one or more of the following focal points:

- Ø Perceptions and utilization of scientific public policy knowledge by practitioners working in policy-making institutions such as the different branches of government and political parties.
- Ø Perceptions and utilization of scientific public policy knowledge by practitioners in organizations or groups trying to influence the policy process, such as interest groups, civil society organizations, and lobbying and public affairs consultants.
- Ø Types and formats of scientific public policy knowledge preferred and used by practitioners, choice for commissioned research and advice or for 'shopping' for knowledge.
- Ø Ways in which scientific knowledge in the field of public policy is incorporated in policy learning by organizations, the degree to which this happens and the heuristics or systems used for this.
- Ø Established and ongoing relationships between organizations in practice and providers of scientific public policy knowledge, patterns that emerge.
- Ø Effects of organizational structure and culture such as mission and goals, size, information capacity, hierarchy, and public or private status on the utilization of public policy knowledge and advice.
- Ø Standards, relevant competencies or larger competency frameworks existing or emerging for specific occupational or professional groups that provide incentives (and enforcement) for utilizing scientific knowledge in their work, recruitment criteria or strategies for staff, such as educational background and scientific skills obtained.
- Ø Effects of polarization and politicization of issues on the use of public policy knowledge and advice.
- Ø Ways in which organizations or groups in practice in the policy process deal with the increasingly blurred boundary line between validated scientific knowledge and disinformation and alternative facts.

ABSTRACT

This workshop focuses on how and under which conditions scientific knowledge produced in the field of public policy is incorporated and used by practitioners involved in the policy process. These practitioners comprise two categories of information professions: on the one hand all government branches and agencies with formal responsibilities in the policy process; on the other all those actors trying to influence the policy process, such as stakeholders engaging in lobbying or advocacy and think tanks. How do these types of information professions recognize and utilize scientific knowledge on public policy, and what are the conditions for it? In what way do these categories of practitioners obtain, demand, select and utilize or deliberately discard this knowledge? The workshop specifies knowledge utilization to scientific knowledge produced in the field of public policy. The demarcation of scientific public policy knowledge is not limited to political and administrative structures, players and processes, but includes also more substantive policy domain knowledge as for example on international and EU affairs, social policy, economic policy, environment, civil rights, and immigration. This underexplored territory includes the sources and providers of public policy knowledge, types of knowledge producing institutions such as universities, research centres, advisory bodies, think tanks, etc.. It also includes types of knowledge and the features of these types, such as fundamental or applied research, theory-driven or problem-driven, and commissioned or non-commissioned research. The workshop invites contributions on the utilization of various kinds of scientific public policy knowledge and advice by information professions within and outside government. It explores the perceptions and behavior towards knowledge and advice and the cultural and organizations conditions for this.
